Livelihood was the backbone of BSSS projects in 2018.

BSSS since its inception has worked towards food security of community. In 2018, it implemented **DREAM**, **STEER**, **SPREAD**, **MAHANADI**, **IRRI** – **CIWA**, **IRRI** – **RCM**, **and MODEL PANCHAYAT** project with the support of different National & International organizations. The goal of these major projects of BSSS was to reduce food insecurity and enhance the livelihood of community.

BSSS has made the community technically knowledgeable on methods of livestock and agriculture management. It also provided the opportunities of alternative livelihood to the community who often faces disaster. Thus, the livelihood scope was extended among the community with the reduced disaster risk.

Let's DREAM a Poverty free Life: The community was well trained on animal health, hygiene, growing their fodder, their vaccination etc. The farmers were also trained on seed selection, sowing methods, organic techniques, post harvesting techniques etc. In all, 3 districts were covered through these 6 major programmes targeting 9984 farmers.

- Improved Agricultural Practices & its management:-BSSS now follows the holistic approach in its livelihood support programmes guiding the farmers at ground zero. BSSS gave following technical inputs that created the positive impact in the community.
- Mobilization & Institution Building: The eligible farmers were prioritized and mobilized through several meetings thus forming 131 women "SHGs" and 105 "Farmers Club" of men. Their farming practices were noted, and were technically and organically enhanced with the inputs from agricultural specialists.
- ♣ Soil management & systematic cropping: BSSS has facilitated the farmers with the specialists who guided them on soil testing, suitable crop cultivation, pest control & management, quality seeds production. In total 2911 no. of farmers were given improved farming inputs who utilized this knowledge and practiced the farming as per it.

Package of Practices (PoP): Soil testing, summer ploughing, seed selection, green manuring, seed treatment, nursery preparation, land preparation & basal dose application, seedling treatment, line transplanting, Integrated Nutrient Management (INM) and Integrated Pest (IPM), weed management, water management, post-harvest management. 1580 trained Farmers started producing organic compost- Nadef, Azola, Vermin and Green manure for cultivation of vegetables and paddy.

Integrated Farming & Modeling: - This was a new demonstration of BSSS thus was experimented only in few villages. The major model developed was practicing an integration of Vegetable, horticulture, Goat, cow, chicks, pigs rearing, fish ponds, mushroom production, Azolla, vermin, Nadep along with paddy. The total investment of Rs. 10.15 lakhs was put in the intervention of which 40% bore by the farmers, adding an average of 25 % to their income.



1320 farmers from 105 farmers clubs trained on post harvesting, storage and seed village program are skilled enough to store seeds with proper care for

♣ Farm Machinery Hub: BSSS take initiatives to improve the agricultural production of its farmers by adopting new improved practices which are echo friendly and also by strengthening the good traditional practices. BSSS facilitated cluster wise Machinery Hubs in collaboration with line departments which are managed by the federations or farmers clubs to save time and increase the efficiency of farmers.

Promoting Cash Crop cultivation: The Farmers Clubs, federation & SHGs as well as

interested individual farmers were guided and motivated to practice cash crop as it gives immediate profit and covered 12 acres of land of which 80% was barren land. The major varieties of cash crop experimented were Ginger, Turmeric, Arum, Elephant Foot Yam, Pole Yam and flori cultivation.



Post harvesting & storage practices: - Seed collection techniques as practiced by the farmers in the community were observed to be inappropriate. These farmers were then imparted training based on IRRI, KVK and NABARD guidelines for harvesting of crops, seeds selection, its packaging & storage.





- ♣ Ensuring Minimum Nutrition through Kitchen Gardening:- Fresh vegetables in a daily diet helps to nourish the body with the required nutritional value. Targeted HHs was found to have vegetables only when it is available at lower price. In order to ensure fresh vegetables in their daily diet, BSSS has planned to promote kitchen garden among the poorest families of the target area. 35 women were trained by KVK, Baripada and were sensitized about vegetables importance in reducing the risks of health issues especially nutrient and iron deficiency among children, pregnant mothers and vulnerable families.
- Livestock management training:- Almost each HH has animals be it milking cows, ploughing bullocks, fleshy goats, egg laying hens etc as their alternative source of livelihood. These families however lacked the management skills which often led to loss of

these animals after the outbreak of diseases. Thus, BSSS in collaboration with veterinary department facilitated farmers clubs and federation members and provided training on proper health checkup camps, vaccination and health & hygiene management. They were trained and guided in a manner that livestock was later seen as the main source of livelihood of families in intervened villages. More than 1900 animals have been vaccinated during the year.



Seed Fair

The Farmer Federation collaboration with BSSS, on the basis of needed seeds formed procurement list and contacted the appropriate vendors. **Farmers** easily purchased the seeds ensuring the quality and within the timeline. 228 no. of farmers benefitted purchasing the seeds at half of the market price. It added Rs. 91200 to the federation fund.

Federations to Producers Company Learning Visit

75 Farmers from the Federation visited Duarsuni FPO to gain knowledge on how to transform from federation to Producers Company.

Paddy seed Village Programme

first phase BSSS the supported the farmers with four varieties of seeds in 20 acres of land leading to the production of 320 quintals of which 60 quintals of seed was processed and 53 quintals collected for reuse. Seed village program address helped to has unavailability of quality seeds at right time in required quantity at affordable prices.

Initiatives by Farmers Federations

Initiatives for Self-sufficient Community

BSSS made other efforts to catalyze the program outputs making it easy for the farmers to start their cropping cycle without any external support. To make the farmers self-sufficient in resources and skills BSSS adopted a new strategy of mobilizing the farmers into farmers clubs at the village level, federations at GP level with a purpose of leading them towards a Farmers Producers Company.

Seed Village Programme

Accessing quality seed in right time in a desired quantity with ease is a big problem for farmers in the community. After consultation with the entire farmers club, the training was given to 24 farmers of 3 clubs in seed production techniques. Of these 17 farmers applied the technique in their field and BSSS supported them with four varieties of stress tolerant seeds such as Swarn Sub - 1, MTU 1010, Sahabhagi and DRR-44. 20 acres of land was thus raised under Seed Village Programme which helped the farmers run their next cycle in time.

Seed Fair by Farmers Federation

The quality seeds and its availability in time are the backbone of good production. But it was observed that in intervention area the farmers lack quality seeds resilient to the variation of the weather and its arrival in time is the biggest barrier. The government seeds on which they rest usually arrives late and in many a cases the farmers have to travel a distance of upto 15 kms. Since, the crops majorly depend on rain; the sowing of seeds in time is the necessity of hour. Considering this, farmers' federation took initiative to organize seed fair with the seeds from seed village as well as outside vendors, according to the demands of the farmers, where they could purchase the stress tolerant varieties of seeds in time at genuine rate with sufficient quantity.

Water Conservation Models

The lands in the SPREAD project intervention area are highly prone to soil erosion, flash flood, drought and runoff water. So, BSSS sensitized 303 farmers cluster wise on various low cost soil and water conservation techniques. As per the farmer's willingness, their fields were verified for the construction of suitable water conservation technique. In all,

29 structures were built including five 30-40 models, eight 5% models, 15 gully plugs and one village pond. These structures benefit 112 acres of crop land of 27 direct and 313 indirect farmers. These models harvest rain as well as runoff water during monsoon and at the same time reduces soil erosion through gully plugs and trenches.

Based on these models and their storing capacity the appropriate crop was planned to prevent the risk.

Exposure Visit of Farmers

To Farmers Producer Company

Farmers' federation in the intervening area were working well, thus the idea to convert them into the Farmers Producer Company was conceived where they can work independently and establish market linkage. We learn more by seeing. Thus, BSSS

organized the exposure visit of farmers to successful Farmers Producer Company in Bangiriposi in Mayurbhanj district so that the farmers can learn better the legal compliances that includes registration, management techniques, linkage with NABARD and other government line departments. Total of 75 farmers visited the FPO directly observing the chick and goat rearing units and having an interface with the executive body of Duarsuni FPO.



To KVK & Model Farm

BSSS through SPREAD project has replaced the existing practices with the improved ones by facilitating technology driven practices through trainings, demonstrations, awareness & exposures. These visits were organized in three phases where 165 resource farmers of 45 villages in 3 Gram Panchayats were exposed to varied livelihood options.

♣ Increased Farmer's Income through Rice Based Cropping (RCM) in Odisha

BSSS work on agriculture & livelihood issues brought it closer to IRRI. Thus, both collaborated and intervened on livelihood projects together for better output expected under professional guidelines from IRRI. Rice Crop Manager is a sub project for which BSSS & IRRI became partners.

Rice Crop Manager is a web & mobile-based application, aims to sustain the productivity of rice-based cropping systems and increase the net income of farmers in Odisha. It achieves this by providing irrigated and rain fed rice farmers with a crop and nutrient management guideline customized to the needs of the individual farmer. Rice Crop

10,000 farmers in 4 intervention districts targeted in this project.

10,000 farmers surveyed for Kharif & Rabi crop and recommendations handed over to them.

10% selected farmers followed up for the recommendations generated.

Manager uses a farmer's answers to questions on his or her rice farming practices to automatically generate a rice crop management guideline aimed at increasing the farmer's net income.



VISIT TO NRRI- CUTTACK

We SAVE LIVES IN DISASteR !!

BSSS also being a humanitarian organization work during disasters. It saves the lives of people by responding in emergencies, providing immediate relief to the victims of disaster. BSSS has its own contingency plan and it keeps in storage the relief items required during flood & cyclone (common disaster type in Odisha) with the support of *CRS*. In 2018 BSSS responded in *Chennai flood and Cyclone Titily*.





DISASTER MANAGEMENT TRAINING & EARLY WARNING

Dignified Life & Hygiene in Crisis (Prepositioning for Immediate Relief)

CRS through BSSS responded in emergency during Chennai floods and Cyclone Titily in Orissa by supporting the community with Shelter kit (Tarpaulin, Nylon Rope, plastic mat), Water treatment & storage containers (aqua tab, plastic bucket with lid 20 liter, 1 meter filter cloth), & hygiene kit (washing & bathing soap, 2 meter sanitary cloth, 1 meter cotton cloth for baby diapers, steel glass with handle). This helped the community with the basic necessary materials at the time of crisis and helped them maintain hygiene & privacy.

TRANSPORTATION OF RELIEF MATERIAL

Reforming the Food Management System & amplifying it as the source of income: -

Odisha is no escape to disasters; it often faces flood and cyclone which leads to the destruction of the seasonal crops and results in disappointment and frustration taking the

farmers in the grip of hunger & poverty. BSSS in order to reduce the livelihood risk of the community promoted disaster resilient cropping like – Swarn Sub-1, Bina 11, Sahabhagi, DRR -44 etc. During the time of flood, flood resilient seeds like Bina 11 and Swarna Sub-1 yielded good results as they could stand for couple of weeks in water without letting the crop damage. The farmers in 2018 do not have to suffer loss and in fact could make an average production of 18 – 20 quintal per acre. Farmers also



practiced storing crops in improved and also traditional grain storage that could be used in time of crisis.

Innovative resilient models of backyard garden at flood prone area

BSSS introduced different disaster resilient models of backyard gardening in the flood prone areas of its operational areas. These models are promoted mainly in Barsar and Govindapur Gram panchayats of Bhadrak District, where people are on the verge of withdrawing themselves from the cultivation due to frequent flooding and unsuitable mud condition. BSSS gave them hope of sustaining their agriculture, especially with vegetables for their consumption as well as income generation during the time of flood, by creating higher platforms with bamboos on which they cultivate directly or use grow bags and sack gardening.

Empowering Community to Hold their Government Accountable

BSSS do not always work

as the service provider, it also takes the initiative to act as facilitator and provide directions to the community to reach to those who are incharge of providing them the services. When community knows what money/ benefit should be available to them and have freedom to speak their minds, they can make decisions to how to use resources to achieve essential services.

Let's Connect You: - The organization makes the Liasioning as much as the core component of its programs as is the livelihood, health & education. The organization through its animators and those who work directly with the community connects the beneficiaries to the government stakeholders. The organization has also arranged several Interface workshop of the farmer's federation with the government stakeholders.

- Hear it from us & Initiate: The organizational workers conduct various meetings with the community and provide them the appropriate guidelines to reach out to suitable government department. BSSS also provide them information on various schemes and the other programs of the government of which they are the eligible beneficiaries. Under the direction of these workers the community does their advocacy.
- **KVK COLLABORATION** In the recent years BSSS has established a strong collaboration with Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Mayurbhanj, where BSSS is part of their monthly Research Extension Information Meeting (REI) which is a platform for all the line departments and selected NGOs to come together to review and make action plans for all the running and upcoming schemes, related to different departments. It has helped BSSS to bring down maximum opportunities given by the government to the people at the grass root.





LINKAGE WITH KVK

Financial support Reached: - With the periodic meetings organized with the community and initiatives of different CBOs, the people have been able to benefit with the financial support schemes of the government such as KALIA and PEETHA. Registering more than 45 % of the beneficiaries with Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT) mechanism has been a great achievement where they could easily avail the subsidies to their bank account.

Ensuring Women's Inclusion & Leadership

Ensuring Women's Inclusion & Leadership

Women in India form 50% of the population. Their contribution in unorganized sector is equivalent to that of men. However, they are hardly recognized as the farmers in the rural area where agriculture is the major livelihood and women are its major practitioner. BSSS envisions a community where the women live with respect without discrimination and free from violence.

Thus, to create women's identity and reduce the gender gap, the women were prioritized in all the programs. BSSS gives special focus to provide livelihood opportunities to women in all its interventions. Thus, women's economic dependency was reduced by promoting alternative means of livelihood among them.

- Collective Voice "SHG" beyond loan and savings: Women were mobilized and
- brought together on a common platform in different clusters where they deposit a small amount weekly/monthly often Rs. 50 or more each and change funds when needed. Having some savings and access to small loans in need of emergency help them have a decent living. Exposure and knowledge in a common space has helped them raise their voice for their rights and entitlements.
- Utilizing skills & reducing economical dependency: -Women have utilized their skills which were further enhanced through training and have started several On & Off farm livelihood practices like mushroom cultivation, goatry, piggery, chicks, pickle making, phenyl & detergent production, incense stick, ujjala, candles, leaf plates, sabai rope and spices grinding, packing and selling etc. With the profit from these small business sources the women have reduced their dependency on men and have created a new

world for their family where they enjoy the essential necessities of life.

Innovations in Training for Women Farmers in Quality Seed Production

300 women farmers of 15 villages were targeted trough this project that involved training and providing handholding support to the organization.

Training to 20 Women leaders in each block of Badasahi and Rasagovindapur was given who in turn passed on the knowledge to 150 women farmers in each block. These farmers got the knowledge on quality seed production technique and refresher training on modern agricultural practices. The women group formed 5 demo plots in five acres land in the last Kharif-2018, successfully. They were also supported with pulses (green gram) linking them with the government and regularly monitoring the progress. To enhance their knowledge further in the arena of organic cultivation and bio compost along with orchard creation and mixed cropping, they were taken by BSSS for an Exposure visit to "Go Green Nursery Farm" at Badasahi block of Mayurbhanj.

105.68quintals of total production was done by 5 women groups in 5 acres of land.

Exposure Visit of SHG Members

SPREAD project intervention area though had 124 SHGs that were linked to bank and also were receiving loans, but in a true sense were only saving group not the income generating groups. These groups lacked the business ideas and thus were utilizing the group savings in family needs. Few groups even utilized the loans received under Odisha Livelihood Mission for other purposes. Noting the gaps, BSSS organized meeting with the selected SHGs and tried to identify the IG activities of the group's choice. Based on the choices the exposure visit of SHG members was planned. This visit was organized in three phases covering total 135 SHG members of 45 villages.

The first phase exposure visit was to "Ambadiha Swadist Mushroom Cultivation Centre" Ambadiha, Udula, Mayurbhanj. SHGs interested for mushroom cultivation were the participants for the exposure and they were from 8 villages of Brahmangaon and Sorishapal Grampanchayats.

The second phase exposure was to Krishi Vigyan Kendra-1(KVK-1), Shyamakhunta, Mayurbhanj. The participants visited to KVK-1 were from 24 villages of Chakidi and Sorishapal Grampanchayats.

The third exposure visit was to KVK-2, Joshipur, Mayurbhanj. The participants were from 13 villages of Brahmangaon Grampanchayat. There they saw different economic ventures, gathered knowledge and ideas along with process of doing them and marketing of produces. The scientists from KVKs held discussions with the participants and enriched their understanding on the various ventures observed.

Lets Educate and develop holistically

Creating Healthy Community

Every human on earth deserves a healthy life. However, many remain devoid of it due to the inaccessibility to the health practitioners, insufficient government resources, and lack of staff in government hospitals/health centers and often due to the lack of financial resources.

- ♣ Nourishment for Life: BSSS focuses on adolescent health. Women and girls are given knowledge on menstrual health and hygiene. Pregnant women or mothers are also made aware of breast feeding practices and vaccination. They are made aware of traditional nourishment sources and given directions for healthy life.
- ♣ Awaking Individual's about Health status: BSSS has organized several awareness and capacity building programs for women and children in the villages with regard to the health and hygiene, malaria, diarrhea, MCH Care and adolescence health.



Learning with Joy: BSSS pedagogy of education is "Joyful learning cum activity oriented". The children are imparted different social lessons in activity form. BSSS work with young boys and girls in school and aware them about the ills of child marriage and how these youngsters can be the change maker in the community.

♣ Well-nourished young Learners: BSSS has established 18 Bridgeup centers in its intervention areas. Here, 207 students who are lacking behind in studies or those who have left the schools or are in a stage where they could be in a dropout category are studying.



***NO" to Child Labour:** To ensure the accountability of parents, they were included in this program. The youngsters often migrate to other cities in order to earn money under the pressure of parents or being influenced by the peer group. Thus, the young boys and girls were motivated and their knowledge was enhanced through bridge up centers which reduced the risk of Child Labor.



Children's Parliament:

BSSS formed 5 children's parliament in 5 villages, imparting them a sense of responsibility with leadership to be a good citizen. Through this initiative more than 150 children are being strengthened towards addressing the social issues within their villages and exploring their own solutions in a democratic way.

Protection "An Important Human Right"

RIGHTTO PROTECTION

Stay safe, **Be Secure**: - BSSS ensures protection in each of its program. Be it staff protection or beneficiaries. Looking at the protection of women and children, especially adolescent girls from the villages, BSSS has ventured in to their lives by creating 24 Community Vigilant Committees (CVC) and 24 Adolescent Girls Groups (AGG) who bear the responsibilities of protecting and guiding the members of their villages from the various forms of trafficking and exploitation in collaboration with the legal authorities. The members of these groups keep a check and balance of those who migrate to other places as well as the strangers who visit the villages.

Beware of Human Trafficking: - The Youngsters coming under the influence of their peer group who have migrated to different cities is very common. The parents receiving

proposal for their young girls from far off places also marry them for the sake of name. These kinds of incidents create the chances of trafficking of these young girls and boys. BSSS takes the initiative to aware the community on trafficking issues and has provided the members with the dos and don'ts if there is a susceptibility to trafficking.

Awareness through Cultural programs

BSSS conducted various cultural events like street plays and puppet shows at community level with professional groups, inculcating the knowledge on the evils of improper migration, child labour and child marriage, the issues which are most prevalent in the tribal villages of Mayurbhanj. It had a deeper impact on the ordinary people as the information passed through cultural events they prefer.



Intervention in the Educational Institutions

BSSS covered 15 schools in Mayurbhanj and Balasore Districts both in the villages and cities, taking the message of self-protection and protecting others within one's own capacities and growing in to the full knowledge of the pros and cons of trafficking and exploitation. 10 Students Vigilant Clubs were formed who are constantly nurtured with a sense of responsibility to care for their peers and friends in the schools and as well as in their neighborhoods.



Dignity March: Dignity march is a national wide campaign by Rashtriya Garima Abhiyan to end sexual violence against Women and Children. A group of NGOs and social activists along with more than 15 survivors who were once victims of different kind of sexual violence started a long journey on 20th December 2018 from Mumbai to Delhi, crossing the borders of 21 states and 3 Union Territories (UTs) in India, covering 11002 kms in 200 districts campaigning against the alarming violence on women and children within a period of 65 days (20/12/18 to 22/02/19). BSSS received the group in Balasore and organized a grand campaign at the railway station, Balasore where a number of officials including the collector cum magistrate, DSWO, DCPO and other social activists participated.

They also talked about efforts of the community women and the results that they have brought, be it social upliftment or Women economic self-sufficiency. members also shared their experience about

The students of Bridge up Centers and Children's Club organized rallies, reflecting the message of their rights and need of their growth. 

Small Innovative Programs Supported by Other agencies

Education Support

BSSS is facilitating educational support for the children mostly tribal, in 3 hostels namely Marshal Dahar Girls Hostel, Vikas Sadan Hostel and KC Pur Hostel in Mayurbhanj & Balasore district of Odisha.

Repairing of Starc Housing Complex

The housing complexes of Balasore Municipality were erected by the Children's International USA, in the year 2000 to provide safety shelters to

its dwellers. 40 families are currently residing here at present. However with the passage of time the buildings were damaged and needed urgent repair. With the local contribution of the families and support of Children's International, both the housing complexes are being repaired and maintained.



People Led Development Program (PLDP)

It started as Farmer Led Approach in 2005 with four NGO partners in Odisha. Later, it was felt to raise the voice against the ongoing policy of chemical farming. This approach then extended to the states of Maharashtra and Madhya Pradesh and was termed as People Led Development Program supported by Misereor.

For the last one year, BSSS is part of the PLDP approach along with other Odisha partners learning and adopting the concept of working with the people, for the people and



strengthening the beauty and goodness of their culture and ethos aiming towards achieving food sovereignty of the marginalised class in the society.

Success Stories of Livelihood Intervention & Human Trafficking – Rescue & Rehabilitation Efforts

"Bore well turns barren land into green -says ...

It was a dry sunny month of June'18 which was full of uncertainty of rain. These farmer's club members of Phuljhar village of Keutunimari GP who were rehabilitee under Deuli irrigation project were discussing on ASHU paddy. They purchased barren land from rehabilitation package and now were hoping for some source of irrigation to reduce the drought risk. BSSS was then proposed by the villagers to install bore well to combat the dearth of water. By



January 2019 they had bore well installed which gave its first water on MAKAR PARAB", the very day of the auspicious local festival. Thus, cultivation shifted from ASHU paddy to Green Gram this year. The sprinkler pipes at subsidized rates from Odisha Lift Irrigation Corporation (OLIC) was the another catalyst that helped irrigate 10 acres of low land in which crops like paddy, vegetables, green gram are grown. These stakeholders credited BSSS for their guidance and support and appreciated project "DREAM" for fulfilling their real dream and "Turning their Barren land Green".

Farming sustains

Mr. Mohan Marandi is a small farmer of Bad Nedam village having with six members' family had agriculture as the main source of income and daily wages along with forest produce added



a little to support their higher secondary education studies. Shouldering the education expenses of the children with other expenses of family was really a burden for him. Though he has 5 acres of land (low land 1.5 acre, medium land 1.00 acre and high lands 2.5 acre) which is supposed to provide him sufficient production, but owing to traditional methods of cultivation he uses to get only 8 to 9 quintals per acre. However, in year 2017 when BSSS intervened through the livelihood project – SPREAD, the villagers learned about the methods of improved cropping practices, i.e. line

transplanting, INM, IPM, quality seeds etc. Following this improved method of cultivation, he got 72-75 quintals paddy on 5 acres. This increase in production helped him providing his family a decent life and easily bearing expenses towards education of his daughter and son. He thanked organization and the donor of the project for helping him come out of this burden and live a peaceful life with his family.

Ultimately Neelu's hope of Educating self-got fulfilled

On MAKAR SANKRANTI, a 14 year old Neelu (name changed) left Karunalay girls hostel of Keutunimari with 20 year old Kati. Sr. Treesa the hostel superintendent bought this into BSSS notice as it has been working on anti human trafficking and ills of child marriage and



child labour for 4 years. The BSSS intervened in the matter through its animator Sulapati who met Neelu's mother. He was however blamed for unnecessary interference by the family as Neelu's mother felt relaxed of not having had to spend a single penny for her daughter's marriage. Mrs. Archana Barik, the Community Vigilance Committee (CVC) convener did not appreciate this underage marriage case, and she along with BSSS team visited Rani and convinced her to bring back her daughter Neelu. Rani being reluctant on

cooperating, the matter was brought to CDPO's office of Kuliana Block which ultimately reached to DCPO. Both the officers took the matter gravely and made her mother sign an agreement to bring back her daughter home.

Mother on the other hand pressurized Neelu to marry the boy. Being helpless, Neelu requested BSSS to intervene the issue and make it easy for her to continue her study. The BSSS officials took the matter to the district administration and ultimately Neelu was rescued by DCPO and DSWO and kept under Child Welfare Committee for future rehabilitation. Now Neelu is a class VIII student at Krishna Chandra Pur High School, Mayurbhanj, residing in the Hostel run by the missionaries, under the full knowledge of the govt. officials.

Singrai from being Trafficked to Self-Dependent

40 year old Singrai Tudu, a father of 4 children - 3 daughters and a son lives with his family including his father Laba Tudu and wife Karmi in Ramkadali Village of Keutunimari GP of Kuliana block of Mayurbhanj district is a rehabilitee of Subarnrekha Irrigation project. He cultivates 2.8 acres of upland giving 7-8 quintals of paddy which cannot meet his family needs. Fearing from food



insecurity the females collect sal leaves from



the forest and earn a little amount and Singrai depended upon daily wages in and around the village.

Once Singarai went to work with other seven people of his village in a construction company as he was promised by a labour contractor to get Rs 300/- per day as a wage

along with food and shelter being arranged at the site. They worked there for 3 months and 20 days both in day and night shifts. When Singrai wanted to return to see his family he was threatened by the builder to complete the entire work and then only the wages will be

released. The poor innocent workers had no option. They returned back without saying anything fearing that the builder's person might bring physical harm to their lives.

Singrai and other members then approached BSSS to advocate for their rights. They also submitted an application at District Labour Officer. Since it was more than 6 months, their request was not considered. Considering the severity of the issue, BSSS supported all seven families under rehabilitation program. Singrai was supported with Rs. 10,000 cycle repairing tools which help him earn Rs. 50-60 / day and on weekly market, he runs his shop. His wife Karmi is happy as Singari is looking after his family and taking after his children's education. His parents are pleased of having Singrai's care towards them.

At sensitization meeting with PRI, Block and District level officers at Keutunimari, Singrai said No more outside sir, I am satisfied with BSSS support that encouraged me to be self-dependent.

Unity makes Impossible ossible

The tribal villages at the foot of Similipal forest range was badly affected by the flash flood of Budhabalanga river (flowing towards Bay of Bengal) washing away roads, bridges and houses. This rainy season it reduced the mobility of 45 villages and stopped the communication by destroying the only road connecting bridge between Brahmangaon, Chakidi and Sorishapal gram Panchayat.

As there was no alternative for connecting these GPs by road, people suffered a lot and could not attend daily markets for their day to day needs. They approached the government

authority multiple times but response was poor. None of the officers came forward to help them by repairing the approach road connecting to bridge.

BSSS has been implementing its SPREAD project in these GP areas. It has formed number of Community Based Institutions (CBOs) like Farmers Clubs, Women Self Help Groups and strengthened them towards their rights. The continuous discussion brought consciousness among the



members. They assembled at a common point and decided to wipe down their problem by taking self initiative to construct the approach road of the bridge.


Soon after the rainy season was over, on 16th November '2018, a herd of 400 volunteers of 45 villages joined their hands for constructing their bridge. They collected boulders, chips and sand to fill up the scoured portion and ultimately the approach road of 150' long with a height of 3' to 6' and breadth 14' was completed. This restored the communication between the villages.

BSSS supported on hiring cost of Tractors and volunteers gave their labour free of cost.


