CMDRR | RUPANTAR

Community Managed Disaster Risk Reduction

Community Managed Disaster Risk Reduction or CMDRR project supported by Caritas India, New Delhi is implemented in 32 villages of five Gram Panchayats of Balasore. The purpose of this project is to prepare the community members in advance to face disaster and enable them to reduce their risks to the impact of disasters like flood and cyclone by enhancing their capacities and skills.

Achievements

- Four groups consisting of 640 Task Force volunteers for Early Warning, Search & Rescue, First Aid and Water & Sanitation. They are equipped with knowhow and technical skills and are ready to provide support to their community.
- 130 Natural DRR leaders have refreshed their capabilities on different life saving skills and techniques.
- 17 tube well platforms are raised in the most vulnerable villages to provide safe drinking water during the emergencies and normal times.
- 1,200 school children are sensitised on community level disaster preparedness measures.
- 877 most vulnerable families are equipped with their Family Survival Kit (FSK) before flood and cyclone disasters.
- 32 mock drills were conducted to sensitise the community on their preparedness and disaster management.



PREPOSITIONING RELIEF MATERIALS

Stocking and positioning relief materials prior to any disaster situation has helped BSSS to respond and reach out to the affected people in times of disaster emergencies without delay. BSSS with the support of CRS have developed a practice of pre-positioning non-perishable materials. Below is the status of pre-positioning Relief Materials at BSSS godown.

In order to develop employability skills among poor youth, BSSS in collaboration with DB Tech, Odisha/New Delhi organised Electrician courses and training on Hospitality, Sales & Marketing. BSSS organised the training and facilitated their placement under Odisha Livelihood Mission project in Balasore. The youths were also trained in Spoken English and basic Computer education.

Achievement

A total of 196 youths were trained under the programme in two batches. Of them 158 were placed for employment. Ministry of Rural Development, Govt. of India and Axis Bank supported the placements.



A Dream Award for Basumati Bhakta

We are two sisters from a poor family. After matriculation my father couldn't afford our higher studies. My sister and myself lost all hopes. Luckily we heard about the skill development programme jointly implemented by BSSS & DB. Tech. Without a second thought, we enrolled and took training in hospitality trade. Soon after the training, we joined at Hotel "URMEE" which was facilitated by DB. Tech and BSSS. We hail from an interior village of Odisha but now working in the capital city of Bhubaneswar and our entire attitude and outlook has changed. Now we are confident of making our livelihood. We are happily supporting our family with our income. Thank you very much BSSS and DB. Tech for making us self sufficient and self reliant. I am very happy to inform you all that I received the 'BEST TRAINEE AWARD' from 'Orissa Rural Development and Marketing Society'(ORMAS).

Supported by Catholic Relief Services, the project Prastuti is a preparedness programme for the community in the face of flood and other natural disasters. The project aims at protecting the livelihood of the communities.

Achievements

- Under the strong leadership of Village Disaster Management Committees (VDMCs), the community was able to mobilise government resources for implementation of Plan of Action (POA). Most of these resources were for raising the platform of tube wells, and constructing connecting roads. The involvement of women folk has considerably increased.
- Developed strong community mobilisation and organisation skills to form VDMCs, TFs, and farmers' clubs. Capacity of the community in organising mock drills and demonstrating life-saving skills has increased.
- High acceptance and adoption of improved agricultural practices with new technologies and the use of improved flood resilient paddy varieties in Kharif season.
- Poultry rearing of landless households has resulted in the increasing of their income.
- Self Help Groups has made income through incense stick making and farmers through systematic Rabi Cultivation.
- Greater involvement of women along with their husbands.
- Women groups monitor developmental works such as construction of roads and raising of platform of tube wells.
- Greater access to welfare schemes.



ODISHA FLOOD RESPONSE



In response to the severe flash flood in September 2011, BSSS with the support of Caritas India implemented the Odisha flood response programme in 22 villages of Tihidi block of Bhadrak and Anandapur block of Keonjhar district.

Achievements

- 2,000 farmers became self reliant on seed security by cultivating and producing flood water resistant 'Swarna Sub-1' paddy seeds.
- 1,974 cattles vaccinated with HSV (Haemorrhagic Septicemia Vaccine) and BQV (Black Quarter Vaccine). The animals are now resistant to SAHAN and BAJBAJIA diseases.
- 1,200 most vulnerable households accessed safe drinking water from 40 raised tube well platforms during normal as well as emergency times.
- 250 trained Task Force volunteers are ready to face and manage their community level disaster emergencies in the project areas.
- 2,000 school children are sensitised on flood response and management in programme villages.



SOLAR POWER FOR HOSTEL

Solar Light Installation Project in Ghatiduba hostel in Bangriposi block

Marshal Dahar Boys Hostel in Ghatiduba panchayat of Bangriposi block houses poor Santhal tribals whose life comes to a halt after sundown due to lack of electricity. The students were unable to study in the evening hours besides there are no recreational activities for them. BSSS, after a need assessment installed a 2.5 KW Solar power system in the hostel for the benefit 159 inmates.

Achievements

- 8 Solar panels, 8 batteries and 1 inverter was installed in the hostel.
- All the rooms and halls in the hostel were provided with solar powered lights.
- A total of 25 CFLs, 11 fans, 12 tube lights, 1 bulb and 1 television are operating with the solar power.
- The hostel is now receiving a minimum of 5 hours electricity daily through solar power.
- It has opened up newer avenues of interest among students related to recreation, culture and technology.
- It has promoted renewable energy as against firewood and kerosine.



UPGRADATION OF ENTREPRENEURSHIP SKILLS OF WOMEN SELF HELP GROUP MEMBERS



Tailoring Training for the Women

The aim of this project was to increase household income by providing women with vocational training in tailoring to enable them to run a business. It also looked forward to empowering women and increase their participation in earning for their family. The project envisaged establishment of women associations in tailoring which would represent women's interest and help them promote their products in the market.

Achievements

- A total of 71 women were professionally trained.
- In Kushida village, nine women are now going to open tailoring shops of their own.
- In Balasore Sadar locality 8 women have opened tailoring shops on their own.
- Two SHGs have been established and they are planning to open a tailoring shop where they will take the order and stitch dresses in their own villages.
- Established linkage with local market and other stakeholders such as big tailoring institute from the local town and getting order from them to stitch dresses.



SPED III

SUSTAINABILITY THROUGH PARTICIPATION, EMPOWERMENT AND DECENTRALISATION

Sustainability through Participation, Empowerment and Decentralisation (SPED III) is a process oriented project aimed at creating critical consciousness on issues and problems present in the community. Supported by Save A Family Plan India (SAFPI) and Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), this project works towards developing the capacities of the people and organisations to plan better strategies and address the problems effectively.

Achievements

- 147 farmers have adopted drought resistant paddy seed cultivation 'Sahabhagi Dhan' in 20 villages.
- 500 vulnerable households have reared 2,000 Banraj chicks.
- 20 seed banks have been formed in 20 villages and are run by the Farmers' Clubs.
- 400 farmers received training on new technology of crop management like use of tractor, power tiller, vermicompost, weeding machine, water pump and spraying machines).
- 13 Farmers' Clubs in 13 villages demonstrated 20 varieties of demo vegetable cultivation and 1200 families adopted seven types of vegetable production in their kitchen gardens. Cost sharing enhanced the ownership.
- Through the advocacy with the Govt. and financial contribution of the community one tube well was installed in Mahulpankha village of Majhigadia Gram panchayat of Kaptipada Block under Mayurbhanj district which had no portable drinking water facility.
- A tube well was installed by the govt. in Mohulpankha village after the continuous interactions and efforts by the community itself (40 families who benefit from it contributed 500/- each).



AUGMENTING FARM PRODUCTIVITY



Pilot Project for Augmenting Farm Productivity in Balasore District of Odisha

The pilot project aimed to ensure increased income for the farmers by increasing their crop productivity and thus their net income. This Nabard-supported project is being implemented in 22 Gram panchayats of Sadar block and 20 Gram panchayats of Khaira block in Balasore district. Support is provided to augment agricultural production and productivity for 3-4 major crops like paddy in both Kharif and Rabi seasons.

Achievements

- 300 Demo farmers, 90 Master farmers and 300 Impact farmers were involved and influenced through the project in the Kharif season.
- Promotion of new farming technology and use of the same in the field with visible results.
- Collaboration with private banks and cooperative societies of the district for loans.
- Promotion of farm mechanisation in the field, like using of tractors and harvesting machines.

Impact

The work began with involving 390 farmers, but after seeing the initial success of about 300, farmers outside the project were inspired and shared interest to take up the measures for augmenting productivity of paddy cultivation.



Over the years, BSSS has been promoting the Disaster Risk Reduction programme in its operational areas mostly those vulnerable to flood and drought. During such disasters, people usually lose their crops leading to the loss of livelihood options. After consulting few research agencies like Krishi Vigyan Kendra (KVK), Central Rice Research Institute (CRRI) and International Rice Research Institute (IRRI) BSSS promoted Stress Tolerant Varieties of Rice according to the climatic vulnerability that people face.

IRRI was generous enough to support these affected communities with Stress Tolerant Varieties of Rice. Thus BSSS implemented four units of Flood Resilient (SWARNA SUB 1) and three units of Drought Resilient variety (SAHABHAGIDHAN) of rice, each unit containing 250 acres under National Food Security (NFSM) scheme.



Impact

A total of 1,538 farmers were supported in 139 villages of Bhadrak, Balasore and Mayurbhanj districts.

ORGANISATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

As a growing organisation, BSSS is currently undergoing the Organisational Development (OD) Process. Facilitated by Association Stimulating Know-how (ASK), BSSS has already drafted its Strategic Planning Document.

This document aims to provide a tool for guiding the course of action for coming years and promote the development of more coherent and appropriate planning practices across its target areas, in compliance with the requirements of relevant BSSS mandate. The document outlines the vision and the means to realise the same.

It is an outcome of critical, positive, realistic and innovative insights of so many within and outside BSSS.

This strategic plan outlines main strategies and policies to address the forthcoming programmes and endeavors of the organisation.
